If you describe someone as moody, you mean that their feelings and behaviour change frequently, and in particular that they often become depressed or angry without any warning.

Everyone knew that Cameron was **moody** on a morning.

Phrases:

grumpy and moody

Julie was **cynical**, she thought Paul on held the door so that he was given a house point.

Jenny was **frivolous** with the gold and silver marker.

Phrases: *too frivolous with* *annoyingly frivolous*

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
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
