Draw yourself as a pirate and write some adjectives to describe you.</p> <p>If you were a pirate captain what would your name be and what would you name your parrot? You could use the 'If I were a Pirate' writing frame, which is attached.</p> <p>Listen to 'We are the Pirates'. Click on picture below.</p> 	<p><u>Pirates</u></p> <p>Read the 'All about Pirates' PowerPoint attached and complete the activities. You will discover your Pirate name and learn to talk like a pirate.</p> <p>Maybe you could write some sentences including some vocabulary pirates use or draw some pirates with speech bubbles.</p> <p>Click on the link below and watch the video and learn how to talk like a pirate.</p> 	<p><u>All About Pirates</u></p> <p>The best pirates always have a treasure map! Create your own treasure map -don't forget the X. Or if you would prefer you could use the completed treasure map attached. Write instructions for finding the treasure. E.g. 1. Turn left at the purple tree.</p>  <p>Remember to be bossy! Bossy verbs- Get, turn, look, duck, pick up.</p>	<p><u>Pirate Rules</u></p> <p>If you were a pirate and you had to have some rules, what would they be? Write a list of your pirate rules, be creative! E.g. Have a bath once a month. There is an example sheet attached for you to look at.</p>  	<p><u>Message in a Bottle</u></p> <p>Pirates would write messages in a bottle to communicate with others. They might write a message in a bottle to a loved one, as a request to be rescued or a deep dark secret.</p> <p>Can you write your own message in a bottle? You could use the template attached. You could also roll your letter up and put it in an empty bottle if you have one.</p>  <p>Remember don't actually put your message in a bottle in the sea because you will be polluting the sea and you might harm animals.</p>

Then swap over.</p> <p>For example, The treasure is under the sofa. It is next to the table. Take 3 steps forward and then turn left.</p> <p>Create your own treasure map! You could use the template attached or draw your own with co-ordinates. Once your map is finished find your different objects and treasure by reading the co-ordinates on the map and telling your adult.</p>	<p>How many Pirates?</p>  <p>Click on the link about and play the game.</p> <p>Once you have worked out the answer for each question then work out the answer if there were 2 ships, how many of would there be? – You would need to double your answer.</p>	<p>Shapes on a Pirate Ship</p> <p>Using the sheet attached can you find the 2D shapes in the pirate picture?</p>  <p>Can you draw your own pirate picture using different 2D shapes?
