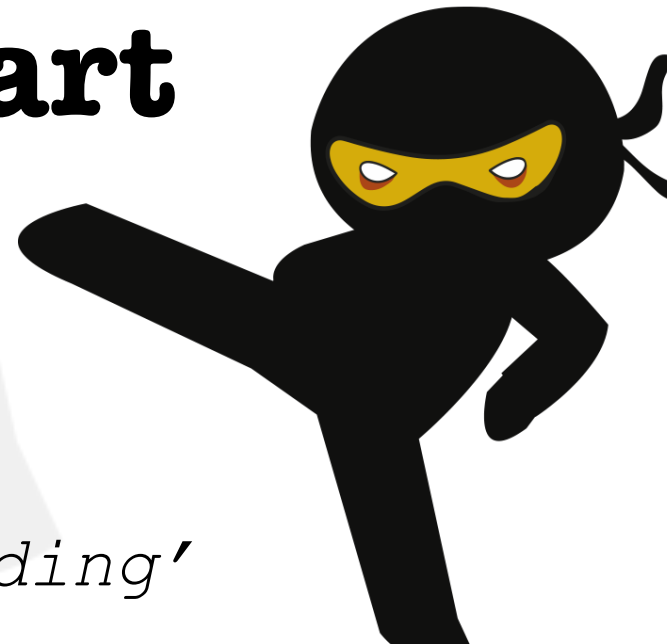

Definition: If you spread something somewhere, you open it out or arrange it over a place or surface, so that all of it can be seen or used easily

The children **spread** out in the school hall.

Phrases: *spread far and wide* *spread this way and that*
spread everywhere

If you shake something, you hold it and move it quickly backwards and forwards or up and down. You can also shake a person, for example, because you are angry with them or because you want them to wake up.

Jonny shook his pocket and could hear money jangling.

The pencil was now **broken**.

Phrases: *easily outsmarted* *outsmarted again*

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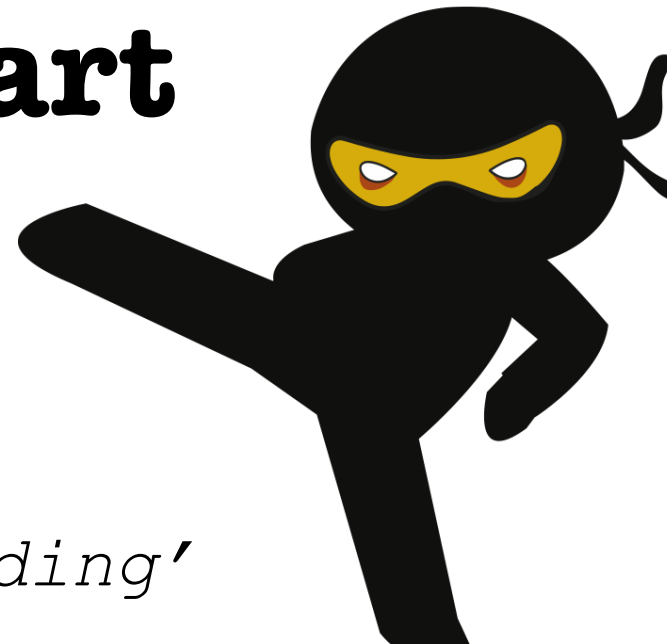
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
