Read Act 3 Scene 4 that you can find below. At this point, Macbeth has ordered three murderers to kill Banquo and Fleance. Macbeth and Lady Macbeth are hosting a banquet.

Please note: it does include the ghost of Banquo who has had his throat cut. There is blood but remember, it's not real!

I would like you to retell this scene as a comic strip. Think about the parts there are to the scene and how many boxes you will need for your comic.

I've added some templates for you further down but you might wish to draw your own into your books.

You should add a brief description of each box and some speech bubbles where appropriate.

My advice would be to plan your boxes first before you begin drawing. WALT: write for a range of purposes (narrative)
WALT: integrate dialogue to convey character and advance the action

Using your comic strip or story map as your plan, you are going to write this scene as a narrative. Here are the links as a reminder.

Think about how to interweave description, dialogue and action. You don't want too much speech or the reader may get lost or bored within it.

Remember to include excellent vocabulary, vary your sentence lengths and structures and punctuate your speech accurately.

- ➤ Is there anywhere you can uplevel your language? E.g. if you've used 'red', can you find a better word?
- Have you used a range of punctuation?.,!?"():;
- Do your sentences begin in lots of different ways? Can you start with a fronted adverbial?
- Have you added enough action and description within your speech? Remember, you've seen the video but your reader will rely on your description to be able to imagine it in their head.
- Read through each paragraph carefully – does it all make perfect sense?


