





## Change the World with a Single Seed



A lot of people don't think about the importance of trees but Kyle knows just how necessary they are. Every single tree in the world provides us with oxygen. Trees also create shelter and food for wildlife.

Kyle thought of hundreds of ways trees make a difference in the world and it got him thinking...maybe he could make a difference, just like them!

When Kyle got involved in learning about fish and wildlife at a local club, he learned about sustainability. Kyle discovered there were ways he could preserve the environment by using less plastic, eating locally grown foods, and reusing items instead of discarding.

Kyle became so passionate about the new skills he was learning, he decided to go to university to find out how he could make an even bigger difference.









After university, Kyle felt a little frustrated. He spent five years studying environmental problems, but he didn't find any solutions!

In class, Kyle learned that daily activities like using transportation or electricity make a "carbon footprint" or an impact on the environment.

He also learned that "carbon offsets" were ways to balance out the footprint by doing something good for the environment. Suddenly, Kyle had an idea: the GreenGas card — a simple credit card with a lot of power!

Every time someone uses their GreenGas card to buy petrol, Kyle's team and its partners plant a tree. This way, when people drive cars they can offset their negative impact on the environment.

Thanks to Kyle's love of nature, hundreds of trees have already been planted along the Mississippi River. The trees help to absorb carbon emissions, create wildlife habitat, and maintain healthy soil.

Kyle believes we can all make a difference in the world, no matter how small. His top tip? Spend more time in nature and plant a tree of your own!
