### Message from the Headteacher

As we end this term we are already half-way through this academic year! I would like to thank all families for their support and the children and staff for their hard work.

I am looking forward to further Government announcements about Covid-19 after half term and will share with you all as soon as possible any changes in the ways that we will be working at school in light of these.

### **Safer Internet Day**

Across the school on Tuesday, as part of National Internet Safety Day, we explored the theme of respect and relationships online. Every class from Year R to Year 6 considered how to keep themselves safe and what could be shared with someone online and what should be kept a secret. Here's a little glimpse of what else each class did:

Reception Class listened to the story Smartie the penguin, an internet safety story for the early years. Year 1 used the story of Ben and Buddy to learn about staying safe on the internet. They learnt a song and played a sorting game. Year 2 considered who helps them to stay safe online and finished their day reading the lovely Digiduck story. Year 3 also completed a sorting activity and discussed how to show respect to others online by being kind in chat conversations. Year 4 discussed key pieces of vocabulary that they may come across when online and what these words meant and then moved onto brainstorming all the ways they can be safe online. Year 5 created top tips to stay safe online and discussed what the word appropriate meant and how they can report any concerns they have. Finally in Year 6 fortune tellers were made which included questions or conversation starters inside about online safety for the children to be able to go home and learn at home with their families.

Please do continue to speak with your children and share in their learning about this very important subject.

### **Deal Learning Alliance Football Tournament**

On Tuesday ten children from across classes 4, 5 and 6 took part in an inter school football tournament with the Deal primary schools at Warden House School. They did outstandingly well. ### **Coronavirus Symptoms**

#### **Updated Guidance**

From 11 January in England, people <u>without</u> symptoms who receive positive lateral flow device (LFD) test results for coronavirus (COVID-19) will be required to self-isolate immediately and won't be required to take a confirmatory PCR test.

Anyone who develops 1 of the 3 main COVID-19 symptoms should stay at home and self-isolate and get a PCR test (see below). They must self-isolate if they get a positive test result, even if they have had a recent negative lateral flow test – these rules have not changed.

Children or staff with <u>any</u> of the three symptoms of Covid:

- a new continuous cough;
- a fever;
- a change in taste or smell

are to stay at home and isolate. They should get a PCR Covid test.

# Changes to the self-isolation period for those who test positive for COVID-

From Monday 17 January, people who are self-isolating with COVID-19 will have the option to reduce their isolation period after 5 full days if they test negative with a lateral flow device (LFD) test on both day 5 and day 6 and they do not have a temperature. For example, if they test negative on the morning of day 5 and the morning of day 6, they can return to their education or childcare setting immediately on day 6.

The first test must be taken no earlier than day 5 of the self-isolation period, and the second must be taken the following day. All test results should be reported to NHS Test and Trace

If the result of either of their tests is positive, they should continue to self-isolate until they get negative results from two LFD tests on consecutive days or until they have completed 10 full days of self-isolation, whichever is earliest.

Anyone who is unable to take LFD tests or anyone who continues to have a temperature will need to complete the full 10 day period of self-isolation.

### **Daily testing for close contacts of COVID-19**

People who are fully vaccinated, or children and young people aged between 5 and 18 years and 6 months, identified as a close contact of someone with COVID-19, should take an LFD test every day for seven days and continue to attend their setting as normal, unless they have a positive test result or develop symptoms at any time.

#### **Keeping School Informed**

If your child tests positive for Covid you must inform the school – by telephone on 01304 852639 during the school day. If your child tests positive 'out of hours' we do not need to know until the morning of the first day of absence – as with all sickness absence.
